- The Universal Need (health, meaning, love)




The Particular

The Distinctives



- Human dignity (vs. human rights)
- Humility (service)
- Longsuffering (staying power)
- Self-sacrifice (*agape* love)
- Power in weakness
- Joyfulness in deprivation
- Care for the most vulnerable (the least of these)
- Hopefulness for wholistic transformation
- Eschatological long view . . .



The Synergy



- Complex adaptive living systems
- Connecting with existing resources (symbiosis)
- Appropriating unforeseen power (*dynamamos*)
- Cooperating with the Covenant Community
- Seeking Interdependent relationships
- Recognizing Messiah's ongoing presence and work
- The Assembly planted and mobilized
- Minding the gaps



The Discernment



- Careful with alliances (2 Cor 6:14)
- Sheep and wolves (in sheep skin)
- Be wheat but grow among the tares
- Messiah was a friend of “tax collectors and sinners”
- Test the spirits (1 Jn 4)
- Dismantle fortresses (*logismos* – ideas, theories, views) (1 Cor 10:4) through advocacy
- Cooperate with people of good will (NT Wright)
- Find women and med of peace (Mt 10:13)



Cooperation and Critique

- Working cheerfully “with the grain of good will” with people of all faiths or no faith in the art of “collaboration without compromise and of opposition without dualism.”






