Plenary Discussion:

Goal: To examine how religious texts have been used to either empower or marginalize, understand the power dynamics in faithbased contexts, and inspire life-affirming advocacy for the vulnerable.

Text: John 4:1-42 (Jesus and the Samaritan Woman)



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- Group 1: Observing (Seeing)
- What do you notice about Jesus' approach toward the Samaritan woman?
- How might the way the Samaritan woman was treated by others influenced her self worth and voice?
- Why do you think the woman was surprised by Jesus' request for water?



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Group 2: Reflecting (Judging)

What beliefs and values might have caused people in the Samaritan woman's community to distance themselves from her?

In what ways have religious texts been used to hurt or silence individuals today, similar to how the woman was marginalized?

How did Jesus' actions challenge the norms of his time?



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- **Group 3: Engaging (Judging Further with a Value Clarification)**
- □ What attitudes or customs do we have that may discourage young people from sharing their SRHR challenges?
- What can we learn from Jesus' way of addressing the woman's personal story?
- What values does Jesus model in this story that is relevant to SRHR advocacy?



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Group 4: Act (Life-Affirming Responses)

- □ How did the woman's encounter with Jesus empower her to return to her community with a new voice?
- What changes in her community were sparked by her encounter with Jesus?
- What specific actions can community and faith leaders take to prevent traditions and religious texts from being used to silence or judge vulnerable groups?



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Group 5: Integration into Ongoing Work

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- How can this story help us reach people who feel left out or unwanted?
- What does our culture teach us about treating everyone kindly and equally?
- What are we doing to make sure our young people have safe spaces to go?
