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


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
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





Full Campus Map

Maloney Hall: Floor 3





Day 2 Morning Devotion

"I am the light of the world," Jesus proclaimed. Not only is Jesus the light of the world, but our theme verses remind us that Jesus told his followers that they (and we) are "the light of the world."

As patterns of work and funding are disrupted or destroyed, we can easily become discouraged. We are tempted to wonder if the lights are dimmed or are being extinguished. For a candle, too much melted wax can drown the flame, or a gust of wind can extinguish it.

For an oil lamp, running out of oil or a darkened chimney can cause the light to falter or be dimmed. The loss of power quickly turns off an electric lamp or causes a flashlight to fail. However, the statement by Jesus persists through millennia in a myriad of contexts. We ARE the light of the world.

When I think of CCIH in relation to this passage, my mind goes to the long-term witness—the light on a hill—that CCIH has been. In 1987, a group of Christians gathered at the Global Health Council meeting for mutual support and learning from a shared identity as Christians in service. Christians working in international health knew that Christian agencies made a difference and had access to communities through churches and healthcare institutions that governments and other NGOs did not. And for these 38 years, the light has persisted and spread. We may need to find another source of oil or trim the wicks, but the world needs the light.

Reflection Questions:

- 1. What causes your individual or your agency's light to falter?
- 2. In the time in which we live, how can we ensure that our (individual or agency) lights are "put on a lampstand to give light to all the house?"

Day 2 Afternoon Devotion

Revolution!

The world has always known revolutionaries. Some have ideas that transform systems and societies, others bring exquisite creativity, while revolutionary leadership sweeps in change. Revolutionaries can also cause deep harm and alarm with a terrifying, paralyzing reality.

But Jesus, too, was a revolutionary.

With mind-boggling teaching, acts of extraordinary love and healing, he showed the people of his day that his movement was the fulfillment of all that Israel had believed, longed, and hoped for. He and his followers were living and would be dying by the kingdom he announced and ushered in. This revolution, this introduction to real living that changed the color and energy of everything, that was so unexpected, so 'other' and at times so unwanted, was also what Israel's whole life and tradition had pointed to.

Jesus was calling the Israel of his day to BE Israel, now that he had come. How could God keep His world from going bad if the preservative of Jesus' day, His chosen salt, had lost its power to change and to preserve? God also called his people to be the light of the world. But what if the light bearers had become part of the darkness? Jesus talked and walked in this reality. He was and is the salt of the earth and the light of the world. He calls the Church to be part of his astounding revolution of forgiveness and grace, to be his agents of change at home, at school, and in the workplace. And perhaps especially as nurses deliver newborns, doctors treat people living with HIV, teams go out to communities carrying vaccines and mosquito nets.

In Christ, we are called to a revolutionary covenant life together with eternal opportunities in the present moment. Let's be deeply encouraged on the journey.

Reflection Questions:

- 1. Many of our organizations are at a moment of great change in our work, in how and by whom it is supported. How can we be positive "revolutionaries" who remain the salt and the light for the world?
- 2. How can we gently encourage those around us during these transformative times?

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


