
### Is L4H accessible & effective?


Learning for Humanity's primary audience is Catholic Sisters who work with women and children in rural settings, including hospitals, health facilities, clinics, orphanages, schools, and beyond.



- 15 learning programs
- Offered in English, French, and Spanish
- 1,591 unique students
- 2,507 enrollments
- 74% are Catholic Sisters
- 442 congregations
- 78.9% completion rate significantly higher than the typical e-learning average.



#### L4H STUDENT IMPACT STORIES



Sr. Judith Mwango, Zambia Improving Nutrition Outcomes

Sr. Judith's "Sustaining Hope" project addressed child malnutrition through awareness, cooking demos, and CHW training. Her team treated 10 children—8 made full recoveries—sparking lasting health improvements in the community.



Sr. Kabule Kazembe, Zambia Project Management

Sr. Kabule's project brought solar power to clinics, homes, and the convent, and installed a borehole supplying clean water to 700 people—eliminating waterborne diseases and restoring dignity.



Sr. Francelene Labbée, Haiti Advocacy

Sr. Francelene launched a local latrine initiative by combining outreach, lobbying, grant writing, and budgeting—bringing dignity and health to entire neighborhoods.



Sr. Lilian Makena, Kenya Economic Strengthening Activities

Sr. Lilian launched a poultry project to fund her pharmacy, aiming for 50% sustainability within a year. Income from chicken sales helped ensure long-term access to essential medicines.



Sr. Cynthia Obi, Nigeria Leadership

Sr. Cynthia reduced clinic wait times by over 50% by assigning staff roles and streamlining filing, improving patient flow, clarity, and comfort in care delivery.



Sr. Vivien Chanda, Zambia
Maternal and Child Health Communications

Sr. Vivien reduced neonatal deaths from 39 to 14 by leading respectful maternal care efforts—offering compassionate support, organizing triage, and ensuring essential supplies and peer support for mothers.
